OVER & HUNDRED SHEEP ON WILLOW RANCH

Have you ever visited Willow Ranch? This particular ranch is located in South Rustica near the capital. It is the biggest ranch in Rustica covering 50 million hectars ground. The farm counts over 100 sheep! There are no cows in Rustica. That is one of the reasons why it is the most ecofriendly country. The farms don't use any pesticides and the farming techniques are also very ecofriendly. Even though there aren't any cows you can enjoy a fresh glass of goat or horse milk!

Rustica is aiming at creating sustainable land management systems and maintaining biodiversity in food production and farming. This is done by preventing soil erosion, water infiltration and retention. In Rustica you find a lot of subsistence farms. That means that the Caretakers farm to provide for their own families, as well as their servants' and Peacekeepers'. Willow Ranch on the other hand is a commercial farm which sells its products, especially to tourists. They practice mixed farming meaning that they grow crops while also raising animals.

A farming technique used is Aquaponics for example. Aquaponics is an ecofriendly farming technique. It is a combination of aquaculture and hydroponics. The Caretakers raise fish and other aquatic animals (aquaculture), while growing plants without soil (hydroponics). You can learn all about it on Willow Ranch but in short: The plants are fed by the waste of the fish or other aquatic discharge.

Willow Ranch is also an open-air museum and a Bed & Breakfast. In the daylight you can enjoy a tour around the farm. The Caretakers explain all about old farming techniques; you can feed the animals and shave the sheep. In the tour they also include history about the farm and a child friendly explanation of how all the machines work. If you decide to stay the night, you can sleep in a stable that has been transformed into a bedroom. For breakfast you can eat goat cheese, handmade bread and as many eggs as you would like. This ranch is the perfect place for children. They have the opportunity to pet as many animals as they want and go apple picking. There are activities for children of all ages.

Everything in Rustica is fresh and biological and you can really feel that atmosphere on this farm. Willow Ranch is also the biggest transporter of wool in Rustica. One sheep produces anywhere from 2 to 30 pounds of wool annually. When the sheep get old, they slaughter them and sell the meat so don't get too close with the sheep you feed because they can end up on your plate.

FISHERMAN'S BACK HOME

Norman from Navis was finally able to return from Nucleria!
